Waitangi Trip

On a frosty morning of March, 22 Year 13 History pupils and four adults set off for a flight to Auckland, and from there a trip to the birthplace of our nation, Waitangi. We arrived at the Copthorne Hotel overwhelmed by the humidity and 'last gasp of summer', as put by Mrs Ellis. After making pit stops at the historical Puhoi and the world-renowned toilets of Kawakawa, we had thought we had seen it all, but Waitangi had a different idea.

The first day was full on, beginning with our journey to the treaty grounds with a guided tour of the museum, then a welcoming on the marae which left us in awe. We



discovered our first flag and just how many treaties there truly were. The afternoon was spent on a ferry to our first capital, Russell, where we went to Christ Church (the very first in New Zealand!) and a quaint museum. Pompallier House was also a highlight for many, as we witnessed the processes at the tannery and made our own prints at the printing press, learning sayings such as "cut to the chase" came from there.

The second day included a trip to Te Waimate and the early missionary houses at Kerikeri where we discovered the trials and tribulations the missionaries went through. We ended the day with a long journey to Marsden Cross where we sang the school hymn, as a reminder of Christianity arriving in

Authentic Christian Teaching program (ACT)

Visit to Elim Christian School and Bethlehem Christian College: March 14th -15th, 2017

Following on from the studies they did last year, a small group of Literacy and English teachers are continuing to meet in 2017. They have the demanding task of reviewing their current Curriculum documents and modifying these in light of their learning about 'Teaching Christianly'. As part of this process, I had the privilege of leading a team comprised of Shane McConnell (Curriculum Leader English), Brianna Tennant (Assistant Curriculum Leader of English - Senior College) and Jan Kennedy (Literacy Leader Primary School) who visited Elim Christian School in Auckland on March 14th, and then drove down to Tauranga to meet staff from Bethlehem Christian College the next day.

The visits were a valuable opportunity to compare practice, review documents developed by other schools and glean ideas that will feed into the writing process for our own Curriculum materials. More importantly, they were a chance to talk in person with Christian educators facing the same challenges we face, in providing a Biblically based and God honouring education for our pupils, your children.

Our hosts were very generous with their time, releasing key staff to ensure the trip was worth the investment. In similar fashion, there was a cost to sending our staff away, and we are most grateful for the generosity of our parent community in funding this, and other 'Special character' staff development programs, through the Special Character Donations.

It was a quiet sense of satisfaction that I listened in to the discussion and debate that followed our visits. It was a great sign of the level of enthusiasm the team had developed for the task ahead. The dialogue began even in the car ride back to Auckland and it continued on the plane journey home. I am confident it will continue throughout the year, producing good fruit in time as these staff develop materials that will be used by many others in the School.

Tool Boxes

It was pretty noisy in Room 15. 28 kids working at once with hammers and saws – now, that was noisy! One Thursday Mr Thompson came in with a box full of wood. That afternoon we all sat on the mat and Mr Thompson explained to us what the wood was for. When he said the words “tool box”, we all got excited. Then he brought out his own tool box and showed us how he had made it. Then we got to work. First we got 3 pieces of wood. We had to make sure that 2 of them were the same size, and the other piece is bigger. Next we had to make a border and write in the middle. We had to sand the edges off of the wood. After that we got some PVA GLUE and used our glue spreaders to spread the glue onto the top of the wood [our spreaders were our fingers]. We put the smaller pieces of wood on the bigger piece



of wood and hammered them together [sometimes the nails would come out the other side] then repeated it again on the other side.

A few weeks later Mr Thompson showed us the next step. Now we could begin to decorate them. He showed us how to do pokerwork. A poker worker is a hot piece of metal that when you put it on the wood, it burns a hole so you can write your name with it. Another thing we could do to decorate was paint. First we had to put the undercoat on. We wouldn't be doing the actual painting until the next week. Mr Thompson got out two pieces of wood and showed us what to do. He used a special ruler to make the side cuts and used the saw to cut them off. Next we had to sand the edges. Then we fitted it in to the other pieces of wood and hammered it together, and did it on the other side. A week later Mr Thompson got out the paint. Now all we had to do was the handle. [Some people managed to sand their handle and make it fully circular]. Then Mr Thompson thought that we could have dividers. We were only allowed to have two per person. We are all done now and they all look amazing.

During their study of water resources, Year 9 learned some startling facts.

- Our underground aquifers supply the best water in the world.
- Only .9% of fresh water is available and accessible in the world today. That equals one tablespoon compared to a two litre jug.
- A family in Bolivia has access to 40 litres a day, when a family in Christchurch can use up to 16,000 litres a day.
- In some places like Australia they have to pay for every drop of water they use.

We rely on water and it is more of a precious resource than we thought!

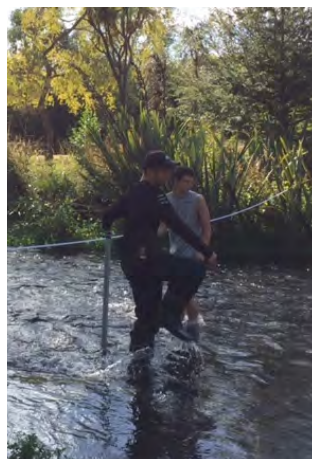
Biology Field Trip

News in brief

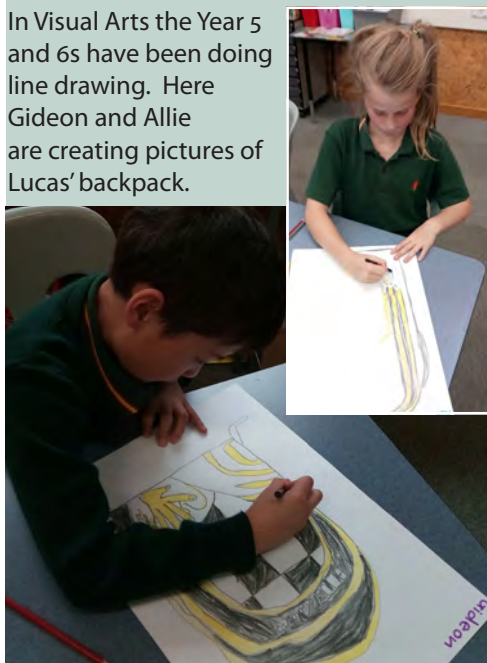

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A New Learning Option

Early Childhood Education (ECE) is a new course that has been introduced into Middleton Grange this year. It is for those in Years 12 and 13 who wish their future career to be with people, have a passion for infants, toddlers, and young children, and who are interested in being an ECE teacher, or primary teacher. This course is a Level 3 course, worth 19 credits, all of which are unit standards, and all internal. During this course we will cover the development and learning of children, communication, the cultural diversity, and creating resources to use in practice and in an ECE service. We learn music, puppets, art, cover a practical aspect, watch videos, and host a variety of speakers. We make regular individual visits in ECE centres, which can be during holidays or school hours. We will also visit the primary, gaining knowledge and experience in different levels.

In our class there are only two males. It is rare to visit an ECE Centre with a male teacher. However, children need good male teachers as role models and educators. The class has a brilliant atmosphere and we have a lot of laughs. We are with people who are ready to learn and passionate about the topic. It is enjoyable, practical, and useful.

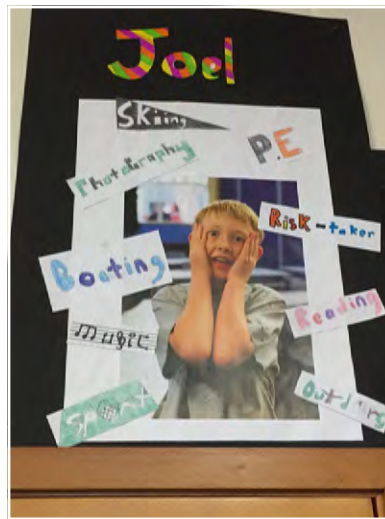

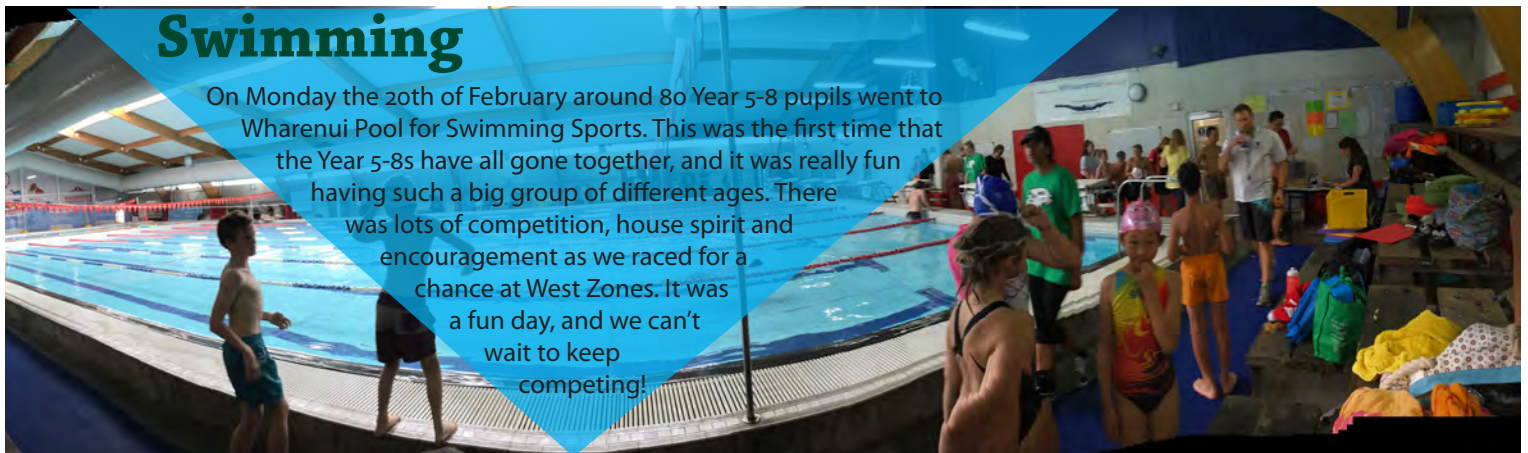

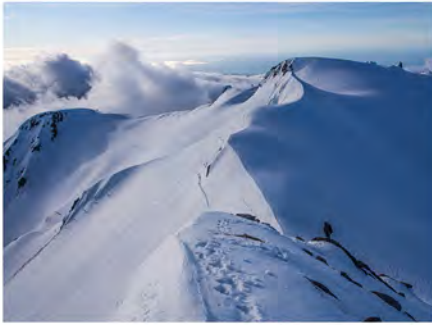
